The importance of effective daily toothbrushing

Twice daily toothbrushing is the key factor in maintaining gum health and preventing tooth decay.

How to brush effectively

The American Dental Association recommends twice daily brushing for 2 minutes with a fluoride toothpaste:

- Place your toothbrush against the gum line at a 45-degree angle to help remove plaque from above and below the gum line.
- Use short strokes to move the toothbrush gently back and forth brushing the outer, inner and chewing surfaces of the teeth.
- Tilt the brush vertically and make up and down strokes to clean the inside surfaces of the front teeth.

Choose the right toothbrush for your oral health needs

In the same way that your dentist may recommend a specialist toothpaste, you may find there are toothbrush features which are suited to your oral health needs.

- If you have **sensitive teeth** you may choose a toothbrush providing sensitive care containing bristles gentle to teeth.
- If you suffer from signs of **enamel wear** you may choose a toothbrush to help protect against over brushing areas of softened enamel due to dietary acids.
- If you have **bleeding gums** you may choose a soft toothbrush which cleans along the gumline and is gentle on enamel.
